#### 6. Witnesses

Your Will must be signed in front of two independent witnesses (not beneficiaries).

## Leaving a Gift to the National Kidney Federation

Gifts left to charities, including the NKF, are exempt from Inheritance Tax. By including a charitable gift in your Will, you can help reduce the tax on your estate while making a lasting difference to the lives of kidney patients and their families.
